OUR LOCAL COMMUNITY

The school positively encourages students to contribute to the local community to realise both their privileges, the needs of others and the positive impact of their generosity both for others and for their own wellbeing.

Through events such as sponsored walks, non-uniform days and the Santa Run, the students have raised over £12,000 in the last academic year, for local charities such as Porchlight and Pilgrims Hospices.



Over at Moat Lane Farm, the Eco-Warriors have planted dozens of trees and saplings, as well as creating bee sanctuaries and planting a meadow, all in effort to support local wildlife.



On a monthly basis our Farm team host The Fifth Trust, a charity supporting adults with learning disabilities, providing educational sessions to build confidence around animals.

Students have long enjoyed activities week at the end of the academic year, a chance to step away from the classrooms and enjoy team building exercises. Last year, the school replaced activities week with Futures & Service week, where activities

were focused around conservation, sustainability and life beyond KC.

The school continues its close ties with Kent Cricket by sponsoring the next generation of cricketeers as they travel to play on tour. Many of our students play for Kent Cricket, our sports coaches have also played cricket for Kent and coach Megan Belt is the current captain of Kent Women's Cricket team.

For the past 6 years Kent College have been the Headline Sponsor of the Canterbury Festival, welcoming acts such as Gabrielle, Ruby Turner and Barbara Dickson as well as classical ensembles Classico Latino, the Sacconi Quartet and Festival Chamber Orchestra to our Great Hall.



CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Over the past 2 years, Lara Wilkinson, Assistant Head, Co-curricular, has established an activities programme of over 70 different clubs designed to allow each pupil to find an area or areas where they can discover and develop their skills. Ranging from debating and chess to coding and crosscountry. Taking place at lunch times, after school and at weekends, students are encouraged to take up at least two activities per week. Each student therefore builds a portfolio of extracurricular learning which can be used as evidence on a CV or UCAS application.



SPORT

Kent College continues to build on the rich history of sporting success.

Our scholars represent Canterbury and Kent in Cricket, Hockey and Tennis across a range of year groups.

Our girl's hockey teams have been victorious and following KC history, continue to dominate in the local area. In cricket, the U14 boys won the Kent Cup and qualified for the national U15 competition next season, whilst the U12 boys reached the Kent Cup final.

Sport scholar, Tilly Corteen-Coleman was selected to play for the womens U19s England team against Sri Lanka. Tilly was also drafted to play in The Hundred, competing against some of the best players in the world and broke records as the youngest player to feature and the youngest to take a wicket.

Autumn term ended with a magnificent Carol Service from the school choirs, in Canterbury Cathedral.

Further afield, the choir toured Venice this year, singing for audiences in St George's Anglican Church, St Mark's Basilica, San Lazzaro and Chiesa di San Canciano.

Frank qualified as a member of the Southern Counties Hockey Umpires' Association and as an international umpire, becoming Secretary and a valued committee member of the Umpires' Association.

Frank served the Old Canterburian Club most loyally, rarely missing a reunion dinner and acting as President in addition to serving on the Committee until 1965. He died in September 1966.

Martin Child, KC 1964 - 1997

When Martin retired from Kent College in 1997 Julian Coles wrote:

Martin Child leaves Kent College after many years of service to the school in countless diverse ways. He joined the school in 1964 and it is quite a shock to realise that this was before people had walked on the moon, before the death of Winston Churchill, and even before England had won the World Cup in football! Yes, that long ago!

Although these early years of Martin were before my time, they have still been passed on to many members of the staff through the myths and legends of the common room. These were the years when Martin, and here one feels that legend may be a little exaggerated, excelled at cricket and

took countless teams to other schools, where on one occasion he was shot at with an air rifle! Martin not only found time to teach English, direct school plays, and play the organ; he also wrote a light opera romantically titled "Canterbury Bypass" which nearly launched him on the international scene!

However, it is the recent years that I have most in memory and here Martin again contributed in many different ways. Not only was he an excellent teacher, but he also ran the library with flair and efficiency so that it still looks like a new building even though it is a decade old. It was typical of Martin that he kept poetry written by his various classes over nearly thirty years so that he could publish it even in his last term at KC and for many years Martin produced the school magazine literally single-handed. Latterly he also found time to recycle much of the paper used around the school and now that his has left, we find that there are countless small chores to do which he obviously once did quietly and efficiently, probably before most of us arrived in the morning.

Clearly we shall miss Martin and we hope too he will occasionally miss us, as he sits in the stands watching Norwich City regularly at last, now that he is free of the ball and chain of work!



Chris Figgis, KC'22

Deputy Head Boy, Chris Figgis touched the lives of many colleagues and pupils. Chris was a student who really participated in school life, excelling in sports, particularly hockey and achieved top grades in his A Levels in Geography, Maths and Physics. He was planning to read physics at the University of Bath following a gap year.

We all greatly miss his wonderfully dry humour and the manner in which he made everyone feel so welcome in the school. Alongside the wellbeing programme, the school raise funds and awareness about mental health, particularly among young males.

Chris played hockey for the school and for Canterbury Hockey Club. He represented the school on several occasions during the OC V KC Hockey Matches. The Annual Chris Figgis Memorial Match (OC V KC) takes place on the last day of the Spring Term each year and all are welcome to watch.



The Rev'd David Cawley, (KC'62)

In 1973, David was ordained in Norwich and after serving in several dioceses, he later held several roles in the diocese of Leicester between 1995 and 2009, most notably Vicar of St Mary de Castro.

David retired to Canterbury in 2009 and held the Bishop's Permission to Officiate there until 2023.

His funeral was held in Canterbury Cathedral in March 2024.



W01, Torben Erik George Sorenson MC, (KC'98)

Torben was a boarding student at Kent College, Canterbury until 1998, when he left for a career in the military.

In September 2009, whilst a Sergeant in the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment, Torben was awarded the Military Cross in recognition of his 'exemplary gallantry during active operations against the enemy on land.' Torben was leading a patrol out of his base in Helmand Province, to tackle

Taliban fighters who were attacking the British camps with small arms and rocket propelled grenades. Despite suffering a major leg wound, Torben continued to lead the attack and refused to be treated by a medic until all his patrol had been reunited.

Torben was laid to rest in November 2023.



Frederick Thomas, (KC'56)

Originally from Littlebourne, Frederick (Rick) aged 84, was very proud to have been a KC scholar and achieved great O level results.

Rick had lived in Wiltshire for the past 38 years. A keen motorcyclist, a cavalcade of motorcyclists rode with him on his last journey to his service in July 2024.

Graham Noble, 2002-2024

Graham joined the school from Bedales in 2002 as Head of History. During his time there have been significant changes in the role of teachers. Gone are the days when Graham could have once been in the classroom in the morning and then led a cricket team in the afternoon. But throughout all that has ensured, and continues to evolve, that academic rigour remains at the heart of his teaching, whether that be in the classroom or in his leadership of trips to Canterbury, Hampton Court or the battlefields of northern France. He has been a particular advocate for oracy supporting the Debating and MUN clubs, recognising the significance of procedure to support informed and balanced debate. Although his decision to retire could not have foreseen it, the timing of it at the point of a General Election seems entirely appropriate as he has created the platforms for impassioned and well-informed debate in the school's mock elections. FEATURES

A HISTORY OF CHANGE: GRAHAM NOBLE

At the end of the summer term, I retired from teaching after 34 years, the last twenty-two of these as Head of History at Kent College, and I have been happy to put together a few disconnected reflections on my time as a teacher. My first impressions of the school were mixed. Coming from a more liberal boarding institution in 2002, I appreciated the normality of the working day. Teachers had the space for a family life. But I also found aspects of KC rather staid and unadventurous. I had been used to an environment where ideas were openly challenged, in and out of the classroom, and I found instead a weary acceptance of instruction.

Steadily, though, much of this has changed. Over the years, students have obtained a far greater sense of agency; learning has become a more cooperative process, and school events generate a real sense of anticipation and excitement.

Kent College is certainly a smarter, more ordered place. My history classroom, for example, is now carpeted and boasts a fully operational whiteboard, the functions of which I was just starting to understand. But some things remain: a former governor told me that she recalled, as a student, dancing on the very same bookshelves that still support our departmental library.

I think that KC is also a kinder school today. As a rule, staff and students speak to each other with respect and generosity of spirit. It is rare to hear raised voices. Much more attention is attached to the importance of students' mental health. The Staff Common Room is younger, better balanced between the sexes and much more united in its purpose.





Diversity has remained a great strength of the school. The introduction of the International Baccalaureate, alongside A-levels, continues to bring us a wonderful tranche of sophisticated, committed boarders from across the world. For this new course, I enjoyed moving away from the relative comfort of sixteenth-century Europe and taking on the challenges of modern China and the Americas.

There has been a much fuller creative and artistic side to KC in recent years, and playing a small part in the musical life of the school has been a source of great pleasure to me. The camaraderie and mutual dependence of a choir on a Christmas tour has more than compensated for the hours spent shivering in chilly European churches. Those trips are a favourite memory of my time here.



My first boss and mentor in the teaching profession was the Head of History at Bedales School, a remarkable woman called Ruth Whiting. It surprises me to calculate that she must have been less than fifty when I arrived as a newly qualified member of her department. She seemed thoroughly ancient and formidable in every sense: a sparkling intellectual with a relentless

commitment to getting her students to think for themselves. To be in Ruth's class was seen as a privilege, albeit an onerous and mildly terrifying one. As I said to colleagues at the end of term, I have not approached Ruth's high standards in the classroom but the example of her teaching has left me forever in her debt.

She shared with philosophers of the Renaissance a view of humankind which placed scholarship at the apogee of achievement, and the discipline of history was her surest route towards it. But the world moves on. Are these values still a relevant part of a modern education? Why do we need to learn to research when we can google? Why should we struggle to write A-level essays when Al can do a perfectly serviceable job at the press of a button? What, indeed, is the point of delving into the past when we are preparing for the future?

I remain convinced that, in a world of unmindful technology, critical thinking is more important than ever. The skills of the historian, analysing complex material and making a case based on evidence, are still a significant defence against the vortex of spin and deceit that faces us in our everyday lives.

And what's just as important, learning is fun and trying to understand the cares of those who have walked the Earth before us is endlessly fascinating. Though I approach retirement with some sense of relief, I know that I will miss the comradeship of my colleagues and the energetic optimism of generations of students.



BEES AT MOAT FARM



The school have utilised some previously unused space at Moat Farm for a new environmental project.

A group of staff and students have started creating bee hives and wild meadows, both of which are crucial for biodiversity and ecosystem health. Bees are essential pollinators, aiding in the reproduction of many plants, including crops that we rely on for food. Wild meadows provide habitat for various species, promoting biodiversity and natural pest control.

By establishing bee hives and wild meadows, we can mitigate the decline of pollinators, support sustainable agriculture, and foster a balanced, thriving natural environment at Moat Farm.

There are 3 different sites:

- 1. Location of bee hives, maintained with bee friendly plants
- 2. Large wildflower meadow with paths, benches and a pond for wellbeing and environmental purposes. Also a polytunnel to serve as a community garden
- 3. Wild meadow to provide food for bees

Sites 1 and 3 are underway, with students building the hives and clearing the land for seeding in the autumn.

Site 2 requires more consideration as further expertise and funding is required to build pathways and ponds. The OCC has contributed £1,000 towards the project thus far and further donations from Canterburians would be welcomed.
